#### Vision

Our vision is for a West Dorset with more wildlife and biodiversity, improved water, air and soil quality, better natural flood management and through natural processes, is tackling the impacts of climate change.

We want to reconnect people with nature, enabling them to as enjoy its wildlife and habitats in all its beauty and diversity.



#### Mission

We will improve the natural environment and its resilience by collaborating with landowners and managers, regional partners and the local community on projects and approaches which meet our vision.

These will include rewilding schemes, including reintroductions of native species, regenerative agriculture projects and delivery of education and public awareness projects.

We hope to help bring back wildlife to West Dorset through allowing nature to do what it does best, and to help people get involved with the nature on their doorstep


We want to do that as a community and landowner led collaboration



















## Why wilding?

## What do we mean by (re)wilding?















Rewilding is the [large-scale] restoration of ecosystems to the point where nature can take care of itself. It seeks to reinstate natural processes and, where appropriate and when the time is right, reintroduce missing species, allowing them to shape the landscape and its habitats






# What do we mean by regenerative agriculture?



Regenerative Agriculture is quite simple: it is any form of farming, i.e. the production of food or fibre, which at the same time improves the environment. This primarily means regenerating the soil. It's a direction of travel, not an absolute.

## 1. Brit Catchment Recovery Project

Large scale extensive, herbivore-led wilding where possible

Natural tree regeneration, rather than planting

Connectivity is essential – particularly through rivers

Hedgerows and margins

Areas of regenerative agriculture

River naturalisation, ideally through beaver wild release



## 1. Brit Catchment Recovery Project

Coalition of the willing

Clear financial incentives

Landscape Recovery ELMS bid to develop project

Work starts now


